1. Why is Grammy Mare leaving her job?

She is retiring to a farm, probably because she is older. The police officer tells her she is going back to the farm where she was born. He calls her “old girl.”

2. How do the neighborhood people feel about the police horse?

They love her and are sad to see her leave. Police officers, neighborhood people, and kids gather on the street to say goodbye to her. One woman brings her an apple and cries as she waves to the horse.

3. How do Grammy Mare’s feelings change during the story?

At the beginning of the story, Grammy Mare is nervous. She wonders what the farm would be like. Then she is sad as she says goodbye to her friends and the lady who brought her an apple. She is bothered when boys seem to act rough around her. She is grateful when the boys bring her a carrot. Finally, she is worried about not knowing anyone at the farm when she arrives, but she is relieved when she hears Farmer Thomas’s voice and meets her daughter and granddaughter.

4. What made Grammy Mare feel more comfortable when she arrived at the farm? How?

The first thing that makes her feel more comfortable is when she recognizes the big gray barn and the white fence. She also remembers the apple tree and how delicious its apples tasted. When she hears the farmer’s voice, she feels less worried. She is happy when she meets her daughter. When her granddaughter Pinkie brings all the horses to meet her, Grammy Mare is glad to tell them a story.

5. What lesson did Grammy Mare learn? How?

Grammy Mare learns that change can be scary, but it can work out just fine. She learns this when even though she is scared to leave the city, she finds friendly people who want to be her friend at the farm.

Grammy Mare learns that many people love her. Police workers and neighborhood people come to tell her goodbye.

Grammy Mare learns she can be happy in more than one place. She has spent many years serving her neighborhood and the school. She also is happy to return to her farm and spend time with her family and new animal friends.

1. What conflicts are in this story?
 - The major conflict is that an egg has been abandoned and the other birds are worried about it.
 - Two minor conflicts are when the birds argue about why the mother bird left the nest and who should go look for her. Another is when Jay is bossy to the other birds.
2. Describe Mommie’s personality, based on her actions and words.

Mommie is a peacemaker and a leader. She suggests the birds all stop arguing, and she names ways they can help: sit on the nest, check in the barnyard and trees for the lost bird, and sing to help the bird find her way back to the barn.

3. How does Scarlet interact with the other birds?

Scarlet does not interact much with the other birds. She is very pretty, and her father is a fancy pet pigeon that belongs to the farmer’s son. She shares an opinion about the missing mother bird, even though she has taken a morning nap, according to Jay. She goes back into her nest ignoring the others until Mommie Bird suggests she sing.

4. Who is telling this story? How is that helpful to readers?

Grammy Mare is telling the story from her stall below the birds. It’s helpful because she can see and hear almost everything that happens and can report it accurately.

5. How could this story’s lessons relate to kids today?

- Kids might relate to getting lost, as the mother bird did.
- Kids might relate to classmates arguing, as the birds did.
- Kids might relate to individual birds, like Mommie, who is a peacemaker; Lagrange, who is willing to help others; Cocoa, who is small, but worried about others; or Jay, who likes to be the boss.

During a thunderstorm, a horse gathers animals to listen to a story about two sheep who ran away from their farm. They went to a forest and then to a nearby house. One of the sheep went inside and ended up accidentally having her coat dyed purple.

2. How did Grammy Mare keep the younger animals who were listening from being frightened by the storm?

She told about how the sheep were misbehaving and that kept the listeners interested in what would happen next. She also asked them what the kitchen was.

3. Parts of the story are realistic, but other parts are not. Choose one of each type and explain how realistic they are.

Realistic elements: animals being scared of a thunderstorm; sheep jumping a fence and getting loose; a crow scolding animals.

Unrealistic elements: a horse telling stories; a crow telling a horse a story; sheep getting into someone's bathroom; a sheep spilling a bottle of hair dye.

Sister Sheep seems bored and is always looking for adventures- in the forest or by meeting the girl or exploring the kitchen and bathroom of the farmhouse. In contrast, Suzy is a rule follower: she doesn't want to wander from the farm and is worried when the family comes home.

1. Summarize the story in three sentences.

A horse tells farm animals about two mice that live in a spa and do their Saturday workout. They relax in a steam room, do yoga, and run through the rooms, but they have trouble in the hair salon. One of the mice falls into the sink, and the other helps it get out before they style their fur and finish their spa day.

2. How are the animals like humans in this story? How are they different from humans?

They are the same in how they talk, help each other, and enjoy the elements of the spa.

They are different in that they are much smaller and that creates problems. They have to dodge obstacles on the floor when they run, and one mouse falls into the sink and can't get out. They also must be careful to stay hidden from humans.

3. Explain one external conflict in the story and how it is resolved.

Jennie was not finished with her workout when Carrie was, but Carrie just waited for her.

A worker forgot to sweep the floor, leaving wads of hair. The mice were careful to avoid getting tangled in them.

Jennie falls into the sink and can't get out. Carrie puts a comb in the sink for Jennie to use as a ladder to climb out.

4. Based on the story, how might the spa owners suspect they have mice in their building?

The cotton balls in the steam room might be out of place.

Water might still be on the sink after Carrie turned on the faucet.

The comb jar was knocked over or the comb in the sink.

The lid to the perfume bottle might be left off the bottle.

- Making time to take care of yourself is important.
- Teamwork can solve problems.
- Even though things might not be perfect, you can usually find a workaround.
